Here in McLean County, every resident is our neighbor. That's why we must work together to ensure that everyone experiences a more prosperous future. Our community thrives when everyone can access pathways to prosperity.

It's essential that we find new solutions, especially in light of the most recent ALICE data. ALICE is an acronym for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed — households that earn more than the Federal Poverty Level, but less than the basic cost of living for the county. And today, there are over 15,000 households in our county qualified as households, just barely making ends meet in 2021 — that's 4,521 *more* households than just two years before, in 2019.



Each student received a certificate of completion from United Way of McLean County CEO, David Taylor.

Here's what they have planned next:

Sam focused on business at Heartland; this fall, he continues his studies at ISU as a business major.

Jayda completed paramedic certification coursework and is now finishing her clinical hours; her hope is to work as a paramedic in McLean County!

Kelli will complete nursing prep at Heartland this fall; she will continue to a nursing program in 2024.

Vera completed her Recovery Support Specialist Certificate; she is now working as a Recovery Specialist with the YWCA McLean County. *Plus*, she will be a Workforce180 Mentor starting this fall!

Sal completed his associate degree in nursing at Heartland; this fall, he continues his studies in ISU's nursing program.

Jenny completed her associate degree in nursing at Heartland; this fall, she continues her studies in ISU's nursing program.

HAPPY 1ST BIRTHDAY, THRIVEMIND!

ThriveMind is only a year old but it's grown leaps and bounds. We launched it knowing that teens were experiencing mental health challenges and that more support services were needed, especially in our rural school districts throughout the county.

As you know, finding innovative ways to close service gaps is our superpower here at UWMC! So we launched a partnership with Carle BroMenn Behavioral Health Counseling and the Lexington, Olympia, and Ridgeview school districts, and the recently added LeRoy school district. It started with just two students and one therapist. Now a year in, and we've served more than 35 high school students from four schools across the county, with four therapists providing essential therapeutic support.

One student receiving counseling through ThriveMind is making tremendous progress. Prior to counseling, this student was constantly in the nurse's office due to severe anxiety and stress — which is understandable, but missing class only made the situation worse. Faculty and teachers have observed that this student is more energetic and outgoing and is regularly in class, due to therapy support. The change is obvious and incredible.

We are thrilled that area students are experiencing greater mental and emotional health through ThriveMind. And we cannot wait to see what happens in year two! "Our students and their parents are seeing how this is helping and they are making these appointments a priority in their weekly schedules. They see success happening in their homes as well."
